The shadow economy generally refers to activities that take place outside, misuse or abuse the tax and regulatory systems – for example, when not all income is declared, when people demand (or pay for) cash in hand to avoid obligations, as well as other illegal activities such as illicit tobacco, sham contracting and ABN fraud.

Although most people do the right thing, some businesses deliberately avoid paying the right amount of tax. Those who participate in the shadow economy reduce the funds available for essential community services, such as health care, disaster response, education, and infrastructure.

Our tax system funds the services that benefit all of us. The Australian way of life depends on everyone paying the right amount of tax.

We get on average over 3,500 tip offs a month from people who know or suspect tax evasion or shadow economy behaviour, this suggests that the community, including honest businesses, have had enough of those who are cheating the system and getting an unfair advantage.

Where we discover a discrepancy, our first step is always to contact you or your tax professional to check if you've fully reported these payments in your tax return. It's better to come forward and fix omissions before we come to you.

It's true that digital payments have increased in popularity, but this doesn't mean that the shadow economy has disappeared. We're continuing our efforts to identify and deal with shadow economy behaviour. It's all about giving honest businesses a fair go.

We're cracking down on businesses suspected of using illegal point-of-sale electronic sales suppression tools also known as ESS tools that permanently delete transactions, re-sequence transactions, reduce sales values, falsify transactions, and produce fake records – for example a customer orders a \$60 steak and a \$100 bottle of wine and the ESS tool then puts that through the point-of-sale system as a \$10 bowl of chips and a \$4 bottle of soft drink.
