Taxation Determination

Taxation Determination TD 2004/86 is withdrawn with effect from today.

Taxation Determination TD 2004/86 explained that if a shareholder borrows from a private company under a clause in the company's constitution setting out the terms on which such loans are to be made, there is a 'written agreement' for the purposes of paragraph 109N(1)(a) of Division 7A of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1936*.
2. The arrangements dealt with in TD 2004/86 are now covered by draft Taxation Determination TD 2007/D19, which issued today as part of the Division 7A law clarification program. There has been no change in our view.
